Change up your format to keep students engaged




TRY IT


After working in one format (i.e., whole class) for 10 or more minutes, pivot to a different format (e.g. independent work or group work) to allow students to engage with the lesson differently.


WHY TRY IT?

Changing the format of a lesson

- allows
 students to
 participate in
 the lesson in
 different ways
- keeps students more engaged







TEACHER NOTES

Consider pivoting to different types of student participation. For example from independent work to group work.

The switch to a new format could be brief. For example, during independent work time, you might pivot to a whole class discussion for a few minutes.



Switching too frequently may be overwhelming for students.

LEVEL UP

Before you Pivot, try using the 'Put a Bow on It' instructional nudge to recap what has happened so far. If students are working independently pivot to the 'Here's Where I'm At' instructional nudge.

If multiple students are asking the same question, bring the class together to address it, then go back to working.
